Wine coming from the North Island is varied in style and variety, with a lot of winemakers enjoying the ability to experiment in the moderate climate. The upper parts of the island are quite volcanic and the soils reflect this, while the lower regions boast more silt loam soils.

No vineyard in New Zealand is more than 120 kilometres from the ocean.

Aotearoa New Zealand's South Island is home to some truly world-renowned wine regions, including Central Otago, which holds the title of the world's southernmost wine region.

The South Island, while larger than the north, is home to less than a quarter of the population, meaning it's vastness is quite wild and rugged, a trait embodied by the Southern Alp mountain range spanning the length and providing irrigation for a number of vineyards.

Pinot Noir from Central Otago and Sauvignon Blanc from Marlborough are easily the most famous drops that come out of NZ.



The northern hemisphere geographic equivalent would run from Bordeaux (between the latitudes of 44 and 46 degrees) down to southern Spain.

Shiraz (Syrah), Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, Sémillon, and Riesling are the notable varieties, many of such being cultivated in the more southern regions of the otherwise hot and dry continent.



SOUTH AMERICA

Chile & Argentina make up the Dhall & Nash South American portfolio, with wineries from either side of the immense and impressive Andes mountain range.

Chile's terroir is part of what makes this country so unique. Full of mountainous terrain and valleys, the country is extremely long and narrow, with the Andes mountains to the east and the Pacific ocean to the west. Many of the areas utilise melting snowcaps from the Andes for irrigation and it is classified technically as having a Mediterranean climate with summer temperatures averaging 15–18 °C with possible highs up to 30 °C.

DE MARTINO

The De Martino winery was founded in 1934 by Pietro De Martino, who arrived in Chile in search of a place to satisfy his passion for winemaking. The third and fourth generations of the De Martino family now work in the winery every day.



Although known for growing Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot, Carménère is Chile's signature grape.



Argentina is particularly well known and deservedly renowned for its Malbec production.

ARGENTINA



SANTA ANA



Establishing Santa Ana in 1974, Opi first triumphed at the 'Wines of Argentina', where he won the country's prestigious 'Best Malbec Trophy'. Proving that wasn't a one-off, he then won at the Decanter World Wine Awards 2009. His reputation as one of Argentina's finest was sealed.



LA MASCOTA



The Mascota vineyards lie at the foot of the Andes Mountains, barely a thousand meters away from the Mendoza River. The vines receive fresh breezes descending from the mountains and blowing along the river, all of which contributes to the generation of wide temperature ranges.



Argentina's neighbour, Chile, played a valuable role in cementing Argentina's name in the wine history books. As Chilean winemakers started to focus heavily on producing world-class wines in collaboration with North American winemakers, Argentina followed suit, riding the coat-tails and branching out to cater to the growing demand for South American wines that was growing internationally. Now, Argentina battles it out with Australia for the title of the 5th largest wine producer in the world.

With a lot of places around the Andes mountains rarely exceeding more than 250 mm a year and summer temperatures spiking to over 40°C, it is a harsh climate indeed. But winemakers swear this stresses the vines and therein lies the secret to good wine.

ORDRE DES COTEAUX DES CHAMPAGNE

A MILESTONE RECOGNITION
FOR PUNEET'S SERVICES TO
CHAMPAGNE, THE FIRST
OF ITS KIND IN AOTEAROA
NEW ZEALAND



THE ORDER

The 'Ordre des Coteaux des Champagne', or The Order of the Hillsides of Champagne, is one of the oldest French bacchic orders.

It was founded in 1656 by three young nobles from the Court of Louis XI – the Marquis de St Evermond, the Marquis de Bois Dauphin and Comte d'Olonne. All were fine gourmets and had a particular appreciation for the wines from the three famous hillsides of Champagne (Aÿ, Avenay, and Hautvillers) which earned them the title "Les Trois Coteaux" (The Three Hills) and then "l'Ordre des Coteaux" (The Order of the Hills) in 1656.

The Order disappeared during the Revolution, before being reinstated in 1956 – exactly 300 years since its initial inception – by René Gaucher and François Taittinger alongside a dedicated group of Champagne residents. They had undertaken a lot of historical research and found traces of the Ordre des Coteaux, which they revived by giving it its current name: "Ordre des Coteaux de Champagne." This was a move heavily supported by 'Grand Marque' Champagne houses Taittinger, Laurent Perrier, Mercier, Lanson and Mumm.

The brotherhood is headquartered in Reims, and is dedicated not to one particular house, style or kind of Champagne but to all of Champagne and what makes it so unique and special. It celebrates the diversity and history of the region and wines from NVs to Millesime and everything in between.

THE ORDER HIERARCHY AND ADMISSION

The Ordre is chaired by a Commandeur and governed by a Council composed of Dignitaries. The Commandeur, as well as most Dignitaries belong to the Champagne profession.

Admission to the Order of the Coteaux de Champagne is acquired through the sponsorship of two people who are themselves already members of the Order. The proposed person must then be approved by the Head Office in Reims, and are promoted to the grade of Chevalier at a ceremony preceding an official dinner.

Other grades, in ascending order are Officers, Chambellans and Consul.

Puneet is now New Zealand's first 'Chevalier' of the **Ordre des Coteaux des Champagne**, and was awarded the honour by Antoine Roland-Billecart of our very own Maison Billecart-Salmon.

At the ceremony, trumpets signal the entry of the council members, who then head the room in white cloaks and medals displaying their rank. They are positioned in front of a ceremonial pomponne vessel which adorns their emblem. The person/s receiving the induction will stand and drink a glass of fine champagne, before one of the Ordre outlines their influence and achievements that have led to their admission into the order, followed by a medal ceremony and an incredible banquet dinner served with – of course – the finest Champagne.

Antoine Roland-Billecart had the following to say about Puneet:

"It has been three decades of experience in the global wine trade – thirty years already."

Since 2007, you built a very strong relationship with the greatest vineyards and wineries from around the planet – and you travel a lot – to position Dhall & Nash, which is your company, as one of the premier distributors in New Zealand."

Puneet started his career in London with renowned merchant Fine & Rare Wines and was involved

in notable En Primeur campaigns of 2000 and 2005, and took the best decision to stop. It was here that Puneet developed his love for Champagne – thank you for that, we are very proud, we are very happy."



With his first visit to the region, and quickly you became one of the most notable purveyors of fine Champagne in London and now, of course, in New Zealand. Thank you very much."

"It is with very great honour that I announce to you my induction into the prestigious Ordre des Coteaux des Champagne for services to Champagne."

An exclusive ceremony was held at the splendid Shangri-la Hotel In Singapore on Sunday 25th May, 2025.

The High Council of the Order is made up of the owners of all of the major Champagne Maisons and they personally gather to confer this honour to those selected.

I am extremely grateful to receive this honour and be inducted

as the first New Zealander into this exclusive club. It was also fantastic to have Antoine Billecart himself present me with the order and medal and offer very kind words about me at the ceremony.

And of course we celebrated in the beautiful Shangri-la Banquet hall with a selection of fine and rare Champagnes from every Maison. ”

NORTHERN REGIONS

LOIRE VALLEY



VINCENT CARÊME

Vincent Carême is a dynamic Vouvray wine grower who set up his domaine from scratch in 1999. His rise to prominence has been nothing short of meteoric. The estate makes the full range of Chenin Blanc styles and he uses organic and biodynamic methods across his vines.



DOMAINE DE NOIRÉ

Odile and Jean-Max Manceau bought Domaine de Noiré in 2001, since then they have devoted themselves to returning the Chinon vineyard to its former glory.



ALPHONSE MELLOTT

Mellot is the only estate in Sancerrois to have the prestigious 'hors concours' (beyond competition) distinction bestowed upon them.



DOMAINE DES POTHIER

The Roannaise coast is a vineyard of the Loire Valley located furthest south, not far from the source of the river. Here, Pothiers creates a range of wines from a rare local clone of Gamay - Gamay Saint-Romain.



Traditionally, French wine was always served with food, so they are often exceptionally food-friendly.

Few countries in this world are more synonymous with wine as France. One of the worlds top, and earliest, producers, the French have had many centuries to perfect the craft.

Romans originally planted vines throughout the land in Bordeaux, Burgundy, Alsace, Champagne, Languedoc, Loire Valley and the Rhône - all of which are still cultivating incredible vineyards today- This pioneering old-world king produces 7-8 million bottles a year from a number of unique regions. The vastly varying terroirs of France are at the core of its success and the winemakers hold it very dear to their hearts.

Larmandier-Bernier believes strongly in their work and their passion: to get the very best from the soil and the vine and preserve this earth. Their organic, premier-cru champagnes are known for their purity & complexity.

One of the most famous regions in France, producing some of the most famed and revered bottlings not just of the modern era, but in many centuries past.

With hundreds of years of history under its belt, it was only in 1935 that Burgundy's classification system was developed into an AOC to better distinguish and protect the wines. This system is based on terroir so the sites with the best mix of soil, aspect, climate and quality over time, are deemed the highest classification.

It is believed the Celts may have been practicing viticulture in the area as far back as the B.C. era.

Once upon a time, Gamay Noir was planted alongside its brother, Pinot Noir, all over the limestone-rich hills of Burgundy, before in the fourteenth century, Philip II the Bold (the Duke of Burgundy and son of King John II of France and Bonne of Luxembourg) banished Gamay Noir south, dubbing it "evil."

This turned out to be a blessing in disguise for Gamay as it produces a much better wine in the granitic soils of Beaujolais.

Château des Jacques' practices have been attributed with revolutionizing the winemaking of Beaujolais. They have notably raised the bar, applying Burgundian methods of winemaking that were once traditional in the region.

Hubert Lignier is held in high esteem by both vigneron and Burgundy lovers. The Domaine owns 8.3 hectares. The Bordeaux appellations were famously classified in 1855, on the basis of the properties which consistently fetched the highest prices at the time.

Bordeaux's geography is largely characterised by the waters that weave through it. Two rivers, the Dordogne and the Garonne converge into the Gironde Estuary. These bodies of water act as irrigation for the land, and allow the region to be segmented into "right-bank", "left-bank" and "Entre-Deux-Mers" or "Between Two Seas."



Bordeaux has nearly 6,000 wineries or 'Châteaux', 53 appellations, and apx. 272,000 acres of vineyards.

The Château Pédesclaux estate was classified as a fifth growth, or cinquième cru, in the Bordeaux Classification of 1855 – a status it holds to this day.

RIGHT BANK & ENTRE-DES-MERS

Bordeaux is universally synonymous with good French wine - Bordeaux's history as a premium wine-region deeply intertwines with its core character.

1725 saw the beginning of the modern Bordeaux region. It had become so successful and so vast, that the region was separated into districts known as the Vignoble de Bordeaux. This was expanded upon in 1855, when a class-system was implemented.

In 1936, the AOC (Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée,) system was introduced which laid out strict guidelines as to where certain wines could come from.

BORDEAUX

CHÂTEAU JALOUSIE BEAULIEU

Established in 1910 by the Duporge family, the sixth generation is still on site today, and they are proud to make a human adventure that began more than a century ago prosper.



CHÂTEAU TALMONT

A family Estate, Vignobles Mourgues, including Château Talmont is HVE (High Environmental Value) certified and extends over 395 hectares: 315 hectares in AOP Bordeaux and 80 hectares in IGP Atlantique.



The town centre of Bordeaux is home to the Cité du Vin, a modern wine museum that opened in 2016 and one of the best wine education destinations in the world.

In the 19th century, Bordeaux - like many regions in France - took a catastrophic hit. A terrible Phylloxera infestation wiped out essentially every vine in the region. Drastic measures were taken to save the plants, and many were grafted onto imported pest-resistant rootstock. It was this action that essentially saved the Bordeaux wine industry. Certain varieties adapted to this better than others, which gave Bordeaux the varieties that it is known for today.



Archaeological evidence suggests that viticulture in the Bordeaux region began as far back as 1973 years ago, during the Roman occupation, however the first recorded evidence is dated to 73 A.D.

CHÂTEAU SAINTAYME

Saintayme is an 'insider's secret' wine. It is a true Right Bank gem. Owned and worked by Bordeaux legend Denis Durantou of L'Eglise Clinet fame from 1985 until his untimely death in 2020.



CHÂTEAU LA CHAPELLE MAILLARD

Château La Chapelle Maillard is located on the hillsides of the Dordogne on the tip of the Saint-Emilion appellation. The soil is a mix of Castillon clay and Saint-Emilion limestone and is organic.



CHÂTEAU TROPLONG MONDOT

CHÂTEAU TROPLONG MONDOT

In the Saint-Emilion reclassification of 2006, Troplong Mondot was promoted to Premier Grand Cru Classe B' status. A great feature of Troplong Mondot is that it can be drunk earlier than some of its Saint-Emilion neighbours - displaying big supple tannins but accompanied by, luscious fruit early on.





Whilst Spain trails behind Italy and France in terms of wine-production, it boasts 2.9 million acres (over 1.17 million hectares) of vineyard plantings, making it the number one widest-planted wine-producing country.

Spain is known to be the motherland to an estimated 600 varieties of grape. Winemakers in Spain often refer to the winemaking process as “elaborar” (to elaborate) in favour of the more commonly used “fabricar” (to produce) as a way of respecting and acknowledging the importance of the terroir and grapes, as they believe they more nurture the vines than ‘produce’ them.

Portugal to the west of Spain is a land rich in history and tradition. The Phoenicians, a culture that is widely touted to have had one of the more significant impacts on global wine history, set their sights on Portugal way back in the 10th Century BC.

BODEGAS REY FERNANDO DE CASTILLA

One of the most exceptional of the small, independent sherry houses, FdC was revitalised in 1999 and established as a master of the production and aging of fine, unblended, untreated Sheries.

After a year of testing the Terre universal wine glass in the market the glass went into full production in May 2024, alongside a Champagne glass, a Burgundy glass and two carafe - decanters.



"A totally perfect champagne in its category...When you study the end results it is striking to see how obvious the victory was."


